

iPad Accessibility feature: Subtitles and Closed Captions (iOS v8.4)

Introduction

iPad has the ability to display Subtitles and Closed Captions for movies, TV shows or music video that offer that option in the videos app. Users can set it as a default and customize the size and colour.

Learning Objectives

Completion of this tutorial will give you experience with the following:

- An ability to turn on and use Subtitles and Closed Captions Accessibility.






This tutorial assumes





- An iPad with iOS 8.4 or later version
- An internet connection is required for this Activity. Earlier versions of IOS may also work however they are not covered by the scope of this information.

Case Study:

Ha Tha is a Grade 3 student who has a hearing impairment. Ha Tha's classroom teacher uses her smart board and videos when teaching her class. Ha Tha has a school iPad he uses daily. The Learning Services Teacher is working with Ha Tha's and his full time Education Assistant to set up the iPad so that it works for him when his classroom teacher is using videos or the smart board.

Using the iPad accessibility features Subtitles and Close Captioning

<p>1</p>	<p>From the iPad's Home Screen, find and tap on the Settings icon to access the Settings Menu.</p>	 <p>Settings</p>
<p>2</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. On the left scroll down menu, locate and tap General Settings. 2. On the right scroll down menu locate and Tap Accessibility to access the iPad's Accessibility Settings Menu. 	
<p>3</p>	<p>Locate Media in the right scroll down menu and tap once on Subtitles and Captioning to enter the menu.</p>	
<p>4</p>	<p>Slide the toggle to the right (green) position to turn the SDH Captions setting on.</p>	
<p>5</p>	<p>Tap once on Style to enter the customization menu. From here, users can choose the default font, size, color, and background for the subtitles and captions.</p>	

<p>6</p>	<p>Push the Home Button once to exit the menu.</p>	
<p>7</p>	<p>Once you have finished exploring this setting, remember to go back to the Accessibility Settings Menu to turn the feature back off.</p>	
<p>8</p>	<p>Slide the toggle to the left (grey) position to turn the Reduce Motion setting off.</p>	
<p>9</p>	<p>Push the Home Button once to exit the Settings Menu.</p>

1. Write one potential advantage for using this setting with a student who is deaf.
2. Would other students benefit from this setting? If so, how?
3. How might you get students using this tomorrow?
4. Would this be beneficial to show all students?
